As you all know, CPM held our Bishop Maurice Dingman Award celebration on Saturday, April 6th, where we honored the inspiring, amazing Hagedorn sisters for their lifelong work toward peace. Caleb and I were truly honored to have been able to help put on such an event. I meant it when I said that you all in the crowd inspired us more so than we might inspire all of you. Having a community where we don't have to rely solely on our own knowledge and connections to build peace here in Iowa and one that is constantly pouring into us in word and in spirit is absolutely invaluable.

I have been on a very long personal journey through the past year and a half or so that has me reckoning with much, including who I am, both in the absence and in relationship with other people. I happen to serendipitously find connections between unknown things in my life and their connection with others in the community and working with CPM is no different.

I recently discovered that my grandma, Mary Clausen, cared for Bishop Dingman at the end of his life. My grandma has been an active member of the local Catholic community at Christ the King on the South Side for several decades and she inspires me and encourages me through my life by her example. I forgot to mention that first important detail in my speech, but I was winging it and I guess more important things came to mind.

I have also been reading Bishop Dingman's authorized biography lately. In much of today's politics and social movements, principles are generally put aside for an organizational power, any-means-to-our-ends strategy that emphasizes survival and visibility over one that emphasizes action and influence. It's not quite so black and white, but it's trending in that direction. Bishop Dingman shows a different way to lead and effect change. I hope that I can, with all of you, continue to live out the legacy of Bishop Dingman to build peace here in lowa.
