The State of Palestine, Israeli Colonization & Violence, and the Role of the Church Post-October 7th

A Synopsis of Amgad Beblawi's Presentation on February 8th By Caleb Stewart (CPM Peace Education intern)

A crowd of over 50 people gathered on Thursday, February 8th, at the Des Moines Northwest Community Center to listen to Amgad Beblawi, Ministry and Mission Executive for the Presbytery of Des Moines, discuss the lengthy and arduous history of Palestine, the creation of the state of Israel, the origin of the conflict, and the role of the church throughout the war. The event was organized by CPM.

Mr. Beblawi first discussed the absence of the church in regard to the Holocaust. Finding the church's failure to act in the Holocaust a great travesty and a contributor to the genocide that occurred, Mr. Beblawi argued that the 21st-century role of the church should be one of fostering peace and understanding in an ever-changing and conflictual world. With regards to the present, Mr. Beblawi urged the church to speak out against the injustices and violence we are witnessing in Palestine.

Connecting CPM with its religious roots, Mr. Beblawi then outlined a plan of action for all Christians. As Christians, according to Mr. Beblawi, Jesus compels his followers to not be "neutral" on matters of violence, terrorism, injustice, or oppression and not show partiality in the face of great injustice. Instead, followers of Jesus should be peacemakers, "speak truth to love", and speak on behalf of those who are unable to speak.

After having granted his audience the historical background needed to understand the role of the church in the complex history surrounding Israeli expansion into Palestinian territory, Mr. Beblawi then took a moment to denounce terrorism on all sides. After this denouncement of the anti-peace actions taken by both sides, he then outlined the facts of Israel's "settler colonialism." Defined as "replac[ing] the original group populating an area with another [group]," Mr. Beblawi made the argument that Israel fits this definition of a settler colonialist state, as it supports the over 200+ Israeli settlements and the 700,000+ Israeli settlers that exist within Palestinian territory. Although Mr. Beblawi highlighted that such settlements and settlers are illegal under international law, Mr. Beblawi also claimed that the church's complacency helped foster such settlements.

In the face of such settlements and flagrant violations of international law, Mr. Beblawi then highlighted the Jewish voices actively speaking out against such international law violations

occurring in Palestine. Mr. Beblawi outlined that these select groups are actively working for a free Palestine— a Palestine not facing the harsh conditions placed upon them by the state of Israel. A few of these Jewish NGOs are listed in the box on the upper right.

Despite these violations of international law, much of the criticism leveled against Israel is often disregarded as "antisemitism." However, with the active participation of the pro-Palestinian/pro-ceasefire Jewish groups, this critique of the pro-Palestine movement holds little water—Mr. Beblawi noted.

Closing the discussion, Mr. Beblawi then discussed what we can do to support Palestinian voices and speak out against injustice. In terms of this specific conflict, Mr. Beblawi challenged us to be informed; speak truth to power; speak out against injustice and apartheid; support humanitarian relief for victims of the conflict; and support the boycott, divestment, and sanction (BDS) movement.




